on this 19<sup>th</sup> day of August 1818.

In Open Court before me the subscriber being present,  
Judge of the Said Court of Mason County  
personally appears James McBride aged sixty  
Nine Years (to the best of his belief) Resident in  
Said County State who being by me first  
Ouly sworn according to law doth on his  
oath make the following declaration in Order  
to Observe the provisions made by the late act  
of Cong<sup>r</sup> sp<sup>l</sup> intitled and act to provide for  
certain persons engaged in the land and naval  
service of the United States in the Revolutionary  
War, that he the said James McBride in the spring  
following the battle of Trenton enlisted in

Hampshire County State of Virginia in the Company

Commanded by Captain William Tap of the  
12 Virginia Regt Commanded by Col<sup>o</sup> Wood  
of Gen Scott's Brigade that he continued to

Serve in the said Service the full term of three  
years following when he was discharged  
at Philadelphia Pennsylvania after which he  
was established in the service of

Sarah Gandy for acceptance monthly which  
he served under Capt David Willing of  
said County of Hampshire State of Virginia  
who served under Col<sup>o</sup> Campbell to the Southard  
from which service he was discharged at Talbury

for no compensation at which discharge it is understood that he  
was at the battle of Princeton Germantown  
and Monmouth and formed skirmishing in the  
first term of service and after the second  
term of service

he was in the battle of Retaingswhere he  
received a Bayonet wound threw the body - and  
a sword wound in the chest and at Camden  
battle he received a Bullet wound at the ankle  
which fractured the bone and stopped his leg  
to this day and that he is in Reduced Circumstances  
and stands in need of the Assistance of his  
Country for support and that he is unable  
to perform Manual Labour <sup>James McCall</sup>  
Sworn to and declared before  
me the day of Year aforesaid

I John Henderson Esq. aforesaid do certify  
that it appears to my satisfaction that the said  
James McCall did serve in the Revolutionary  
war as stated in his preceding declaration against  
the Common Country and that he is in Indigent  
Circumstances unable to perform Manual Labour  
for Subsistence and absolutely stands in need  
of the support of his Country

On the twenty seventh day of September  
in the year eighteen hundred and twenty personally  
appeared before the Superior Court of Law for said  
County of Mason being a Court of Record proceeding  
according to the Course of Common Law with the  
jurisdiction unlimited in Plaintiff of Amount  
James Ellsler aged seventy one years, to the best  
of his belief, a citizen of said County of Mason; who  
being first duly sworn according to law doth  
on his Oath declare that he served in the War  
between the States as follows: That in the Spring  
following the battle of Braxton he enlisted in  
Hampshire County, State of Virginia in the Compa-  
ny commanded by Capt. William Doff of  
the 12th Virginian Regiment commanded by Col.  
Wood of General Yeats brigade that this declar-  
ant continued in said service for the term of  
three years next following when he was disch-  
arged at Philadelphia in the State of Pennsylvania  
after which discharge he enlisted in platoons of militia  
of Maryland for the eighteen months and served under  
Captain David Williams of the County of Harf.  
shire and in the Regiment commanded by Col.  
Campbell - From this last service after performing  
the same he was discharged at Gallieburg in  
North Carolina - That to entitle himself to a pension  
now under the acts of Congress in such cases  
made and provided he made a declaration

in Pursuance of said Acts on the Nineteenth day of August in the year eighteen hundred & eighteen.

That under & by virtue of said Acts of Declaration he was placed on the list of Revolutionary Pensioners of the United States and his name inscribed on the pension list Roll of the Virginia agency as more fully appears by his Certificate of Pension Number 7181 and dated the 5th of March 1819

And I the said James C. Baker do solemnly swear that I was a Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not since that time by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary war", passed on the eighteenth of March 1818, and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, Contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed and which schedule contains One Horse Three Cows & One Sheep One feather bed and bedding One Mattress bed and Covering One Blanket One pot One Kettle Six Head of sheep and perhaps about twelve Head of hogs.

The declarant also states that with the aid of his children he cultivates a small piece of ground but is unable to do much of the manual part of said labor himself. That his family consists of himself, his wife and three children one of whom is nearly of age and a son who is a minor.

The second is a boy aged about eighteen years and  
smaller of his age. The third is a daughter aged  
fourteen in July last.

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 38193, it appears that James McDade, while residing in Hampshire County, Virginia, enlisted sometime in the spring of 1777, and served three years as a private in Captain William Vause's Company, Colonel Wood's Virginia Regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth, and several skirmishes.

Shortly after the above noted service, he re-enlisted and served eighteen months as a private in Captain David Williams' Company, Colonel Campbell's Virginia Regiment. He was in the battles of Rutaw Springs, where he received a bayonet wound through his body and a sword wound on the wrist, and Camden, where wounded on the ankle by a bullet.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 19, 1818, at which time he was residing in Mason County, Virginia, and was sixty-nine years of age.

In 1820, he referred to his wife and three children,  
a son nearly of age, son, sixteen years old and a daughter,  
fourteen years old, no names given.

He died June 30, 1833.
